(Continued from page 1) Though we sometimes hear from parents who would like to consider uniforms, most of our school community feels that dress is one way for our students to express individuality. We do, however, want our students to have the freedom to run, jump, sit on the floor and do all the activities children should do while keeping their modesty intact and while not having to constantly tug at their clothing. With every change of season, we encourage our families to review the dress code before going shopping for school clothes.

#### Let's talk about carpool...

Morning carpool usually begins lining up at 7:00 AM. Students should always remain in their cars until the carpool helpers arrive on duty at 7:30 AM and the



members have after-school appointments. In addition, this area needs to remain clear for day care vans to come in and take the left hand lane without having to drive up on the median.

school doors open for students to enter the building. Students should never be dropped off at carpool prior to reaching the carpool helpers and parents should not park and walk in unless they have a volunteer commitment or an appointment in the building. Those who are coming into the building from a parked car should only cross at the crosswalk which is between the first and second carpool helper. The carpool helper will wave the walkers over during a time when all cars are stopped to let out their passengers. The tardy bell rings at 8:00, at which time students should be in their classrooms, unpacked and seated, ready to begin their morning work. Students who need additional help or who have academic questions should come right at 7:30. The teachers are in their rooms and begin their instruction at that time.

Children who are tardy (including children who are in the building but who are not in their rooms when the tardy bell rings) will need to sign in at the front office and secure a tardy pass to enter the classroom.

Parents who have afternoon appointments with teachers and others on the staff will need to alert the carpool supervisor and park in the lot instead of going through the carpool line. All parents who are picking up children by car need to stay in the carpool line. Finally, regular carpool parents need to have a card with the child's name printed in bold letters on the dash or hanging from the mirror so staff can have the child ready for a quick and efficient pick-up.

### School Bus 101

### A Guide to Successfully Riding the **Bus to and from School**

Each year, many new students ride the school bus for the very first time. This can be an exciting first experience for our

youngest Rockets as well as a familiar tradition for our seasoned riders. We encourage all our Rockets to ride the bus to and from school. It's free and gets you to school on time!

The primary goal is to ensure a safe and secure ride. At the same time, riding the bus is a privilege. Every Rocket is expected to abide by the

bus rules, which are extremely simple and easy to understand. Please review these rules with your child to ensure they understand the responsibilities that come with this privilege.

- Always sit in your assigned seat.
- Be at the bus stop at least 10 minutes prior to a scheduled stop time.
- Obey the bus driver and cooperate with him/her.
- Stay in your seat until the bus has come to a complete stop.
- Cross the street in FRONT of the bus
- Don't ask the driver to make a special
- assigned bus stop.

- Keep your hands, head, and feet inside the bus.
- No touching other students or their belongings.

 No hitting, spitting, pinching, or fighting.

- •Keep your voice down while riding.
- No eating or drinking on the bus.
- Refrain from using cellular telephones and other electronic devices while on the bus.

If a student causes a disturbance on the bus, the driver will write a

referral and notify the office. If a student receives a second referral from the driver, he will lose the privilege of riding the school bus, and the parent or guardian will have the responsibility of getting their child to and from school. The CMS Student Rights and Responsibilities Handbook states that any behavior, which substantially distracts the bus driver and causes, or has the potential to cause, a safety hazard on a moving bus, may result in an automatic bus suspension.

Riding the bus should be a positive and safe experience for every Rocket. Students are expected to be respectful to each other, responsible for their actions, relationships with one another. Please encourage your child to inform the bus driver, a teacher, or an administrator if a

# Why Providence Spring Celebrates Our First and Our Strongest School Partner, Providence Presbyterian Church

Long, long ago, 2002 to be exact, Providence Spring was built to house the overflow of McKee Road Elementary School which at that time was the largest elementary school in the state with over 1,600 students in grades K-5.

It was clear that we were in a bit of trouble when August came and the building was not complete and, of course, there was no certificate of occupancy on the horizon.

Staff meetings and in-service events had been held at various locations throughout Matthews and at **Providence Presbyterian Church**.

The Meet the Teacher event was postponed until the very last minute which was the Friday before school began on Monday. What were we to do? Our neighbor invited us over and we had our first Meet and Greet at **Providence Presbyterian Church**.

As a "welcome to the neighborhood" gift, we received a beautiful photo of the rock covered spring for which we are named and a history of the Providence Community of which we were now a part. The photo and the book given to us by our partner, **Providence Presbyterian Church**, are both in our media center and enjoyed by all to this day.

It became quite clear to us early on that one commodity which would always be in scarce supply here at Providence Spring would be parking space real estate. With a large employee base, a record number of visitors, and the most active PTA/parent group in the system, we could easily fill a parking deck. We only had to make our problem known to our special guardian angel up the driveway and, like magic, we now have use of their main parking lot, and the lot across Alexa for our overflow events such as Celebration of Nations and our annual 5th Grade Graduation. Again, **Providence Presbyterian Church** has come to our rescue.

Early on, a Providence Spring legend, Steve Houser who is now retired, assumed the duties of "Guardian of the Grounds" as he realized the value of the two campuses for both nature studies and historic studies since this area was a "hotbed" of Patriot activity during the Revolutionary War. Mr. Houser, a native of Indian Trail, has more connections in this area than anyone I know



and arranged for our faculty to use the historic cemetery, the walkway down to and the area around the rock covered spring and on several occasions each year, he even secured permission for our 5th graders to visit the sanctuary as they were learning about the work of the Continental Congress. **Providence Presbyterian**Church felt quite confident that Mr. Houser and other faculty and our children would treat their grounds as respectfully as we treat our own.

So, for all these reasons, each year I place flowers in the sanctuary of **Providence Presbyterian** with a note in their bulletin reminding them of how fortunate we feel to have such a giving neighbor and a supporting partner right next door and pledging our (Continued on page 8)
