A Message from Our Principal

Dear PSE Families,

Happy 2017. As we all make our personal resolutions for this new year, our faculty and staff have a collective resolution to revisit the 3rd pillar of our school's culture and to put more emphasis on our children's spending time in our outdoor classrooms and taking a closer look at environmental conservation.

I guess two personal experiences I have had recently put environmental concerns on the "front burner" of my list as I am determined to be part of the solution, not part of the problem. The first experience occurred right here in North Carolina (Lake Lure, to be exact) when I was in Europe visiting my older daughter. Watching the raging fires on my iPad was a helpless feeling as I was wishing with fingers crossed that the damage would leave no one injured and all fire fighters safe. The second incident involved my younger daughter traveling across the world to attend the wedding of a friend. The pollution was so great in the city where she visited that all were advised to stay inside or wear a mask. The pictures sent home showed people faintly visible through what looked like a thick fog right in the middle of the day.

So, what does any of this have to do with us here at Providence Spring?

Many educators and parents have read Richard Louv's Last Child in the Woods where he explains that the unwanted side effect of the electronic age is our societal disconnect with nature. This disconnect has some consequences for a whole generation of plugged-in children whose brains are not made for the overstimulation of an artificial environment we've carved out for them. Louv encourages all of us to use the woods, fields, streams and canyons around our homes to keep our children active and healthy in nature, as nature intended.

And this mandate to "go outside" takes us to two additional topics that we need to think about. In order to have the pristine natural areas in which our children can play, we need to be active conservationists ourselves. Nature is not an unlimited resource and land that is developed goes out of use at least for our lifetimes. As adults we must repeatedly ask ourselves, "In what

condition do we want to leave the world for our children and grandchildren?"

Closely related to this last point is a comment that our former outdoor



coordinator and gifted teacher, Steve Houser, used to make to the staff frequently. "We must get our students outside and teach them to appreciate nature if they are to grow up and be the leaders of tomorrow who protect the earth for future generations."

To greet the New Year, Mrs. Conroy, who is now the outdoor coordinator and gifted education teacher, has designated 7 major areas on campus that can be used for learning in a variety of subjects. These include:

- Several observation/journaling stations (along the back of the building)
- The PSE Bog Garden
- Branch Creek Preserve amphitheater
- Branch Creek area
- Big rocks area (aka Bluebird Meadow)
- PSE Sensory Garden
- PSE Courtyard

A faculty sign-up has been created for the use of these areas so a teacher can schedule uninterrupted time for his/her students outside with a specific lesson in mind and the students' nature journals in tow.

If conservation is your "cup of tea" you may want to monitor efforts designed to reduce environmental regulations and/or you may want to become active in one of the many non-profits that have as their mission, protection of wildlife and national part areas for future generations to also enjoy. If you have a love of nature, a knowledge of the outdoors and would like to be a part of this effort at PSE, I would encourage you to send us your name and tell us a bit about your passion. We would love to have you join our efforts in creating 934 active conservationists who will be learners and leaders in securing our natural spaces for the generations who follow them.

The students and families of PSE have been busy this past quarter studying the monthly character traits of honesty and caring. Many grade level service projects have happened that have shown caring toward others, such as the second grade team's amazing collection for the TLC orphanage in Africa. The team and students raised donations totaling over \$3000 during their African Safari Night. The students spent the night learning about the culture and traditions of Africa through songs/music, crafts, and SMART board activities.

The fifth graders have recently raised money for Flint Michigan Water to provide the community with clean drinking water. The student donations totaled over \$2,250.

The book fair/book drive was also a huge success with our Rockets donating 144 brand new books to Levine Children's Hospital. In addition, to the \$265 raised to purchase part of the 144 books, Scholastic also donated 265 books to kids in need in our community. What an amazing way to show we care with the gift of literature and knowledge!
