Each month, Art Appreciation lessons are taught by wonderful parent volunteers in every class. In March, all our students learned about the painter Bob Ross, who parents might remember from the PBS television show, *The Joy of Painting*, which aired in the 1980s and '90s.

March 23 – Thursday. Providence Spring served as a demonstration site for conference goers from 10 states and from the Philippines as well as our neighboring school, Beverly Woods, which is going through the second year of Paideia implementation. Demonstration seminars were held in the following teachers' classrooms: Ms. Blaszak, Mrs. Shelton, Mrs. Arbo, Mrs. Columbus, Mrs. Adamson and Mrs. Trevisan... to rave reviews.


That afternoon, our **11 National Faculty members attended a National Faculty leadership meeting** at the conference site. The National Faculty from PSE includes Mr. Surratt, Mrs. Shelton, Mrs. Conroy, Mrs. Bernier-Lucien, Mrs. Ikoko, Ms. Keith, Mrs. Pistorio, Mrs. O'Connor, Mrs. Adamson, Mrs. Trevisan and, yes, they let me in, too.

March 25 – Friday. **Our own Ann Clark gave the keynote address**, "Why Excellence Matters," and cited Providence Spring and its faculty as one of the finest schools in Charlotte, corrected herself and said "in the state" and then corrected herself again and said if we had a way to measure performance nationally, "probably in the nation." She recognized the hard work of our teachers and said that she visited PSE the first day of this school year (and she did) and we were all hard at work. She continued by saying she will again be on our campus the last day of this school year and she expects to see the same rigor and challenge our school has become known for – even on the last day.

Just an aside... being recognized by someone we all so admire feels very good. And, for the break-out sessions Friday afternoon, you may recognize the following names who were presenters:

I tell all of you this information for **three reasons**. **First**, the support you, through your PTA, provide us, allows us the incredible opportunity to grow as educators and to weave the magic of the Paideia philosophy of teaching and learning throughout our school. Your support of yearly professional development costs, your volunteering for teacher planning days, your covering the cost of conference registration and some limited travel, and your payment of substitutes for national faculty when they are away for training have allowed us to provide a program for our students **that is much better today than it was just a year or so ago** but not nearly as good as it will be in the future with the support you continue to provide. **Second**, with your assistance, we are helping to spread good practice in our neighboring schools, which



in turn makes us stronger because we go from being a Paideia oasis to a Paideia partner in this labor-intensive endeavor. Third – and this is what keeps me up at night – we want you to never lose sight of the value of a Paideia education for our children. Whatever the changes that might occur in our environment, PSE parents must always insist that our children be "educationally reared" in this challenging and rigorous fashion because... they deserve nothing less.

So, thanks for supporting the best of the educational world for the students who will be quite capable of taking over the reins one day quite soon. We salute your untiring efforts, your understanding of excellence, and your sharing of a common vision for our children which helps us to follow Ralph Waldo Emerson's sage advice:

"Do not go where the path may lead; go, instead, where there is no path and leave a trail."
