## Riding the Bus: the 3 R's

Respect, Responsibility and Relationships are three words your student(s) should be familiar with as a PSE Rocket. They form the foundation of our behavior expectations at school. The 3 R's, as we call them, are key to a student's success now and in the future.

Sometimes, we find that students remember the 3 R's between the hours of 8 am and 3 pm, but forget them during the half-hour bus ride to and from school. In CMS, the bus stop and bus are considered an extension of the school day and all school rules apply.

As you discuss daily events from school, think about working in a few of the following ideas for how your child/children might show the 3 R's on the school bus:

Respect: Be courteous and respectful of the bus driver and other students on the bus.



# The Cornerstone of Paideia

PSE is founded on the belief in four pillars: Character Education, Outdoor Education, Technology Integration, and the belief in the Paideia philosophy of education. It is easy to see evidence of technology, character education, and a commitment to the outdoors around our school. But what is Paideia?

Paideia is a teaching and learning philosophy based on the teachings of Mortimer J. Adler outlined in his book "The Paideia Proposal." In this work, Adler identified twelve principles or beliefs that should be evident in a Paideia school. These twelve principles are posted in every classroom at PSE to remind us as we plan, implement, and reflect on teaching and learning in our classroom and throughout the school.

These twelve statements form the foundation of the rigorous educational opportunities we offer at PSE. We believe that the time students spend here in our school is preparation not for just this year or just during childhood but for life beyond the walls of our school. Education should be a lifelong pursuit, and the goal of a Paideia school is to develop well rounded individuals who are able to think critically, listen actively, and speak intelligently in order to become productive, contributing members of society.

The cornerstone of the Paideia philosophy of teaching and learning is the seminar. All students and even staff members engage in Paideia seminars on a regular basis. A seminar is an intellectual discussion of ideas from a text, a painting, song lyrics, photographs, artifacts, or any other source material. Preparation for seminar begins several days in advance through multiple readings and examination of a text as well as clarifying the meaning of vocabulary so that students can begin to formulate ideas and thoughts about the text. On seminar day, students sit in a circle and share their thoughts, questions, and wonderings about a rigorous text. After the seminar students transition to a writing task that integrates the text and the big ideas discussed at the seminar.

Next time you are on campus, see if you can find evidence of the Paideia philosophy in your child's classroom. Ask your child about their latest seminar in the classroom. Your child participated in a School Wide Seminar on November 29.

You have an opportunity to participate in a seminar yourself! Dr. Terry Roberts, director of the National Paideia Center in Asheville, will be on campus on December 12, at 6:30 PM to facilitate a community seminar. Come and participate in a seminar and see the Paideia philosophy in action for yourself. You will receive an invitation via Listserve.

Respect: The buses are tight; many are at capacity. Students should sit in their assigned seat and move over to allow others to sit down quickly.

Respect/Responsibility: Talk quietly. Loud noises are distracting and can cause the driver to take their eyes off the road. The driver's first priority is getting students to and from school safely.

Respect/Responsibility: Bus delays can be avoided when students find their seat quickly. This also keeps other vehicles waiting on the bus moving.

Responsibility: Students should stay seated at all times. If a driver has to stop suddenly, they could be thrown forward if not seated properly.

Responsibility: Keep the bus aisle clear of legs, feet, backpacks, etc. This will keep students from tripping and provides a safe path to the emergency door if needed.

Responsibility: Keep ALL objects to yourself. Besides talking quietly, reading is another acceptable activity on the bus. While it would be great to get homework completed, pens and pencils should not be out on the bus - someone might get hurt.

Respect/Responsibility/Relationships: Be careful of the words you speak. Inappropriate language is never acceptable, but kind words are always a good choice!

Respect/Responsibility/Relationships: We love our bus drivers! Let's recognize how valuable they are. Remind students that the bus driver is an "extension" of the school. Their teacher is in charge of the classroom and the bus driver is in charge of the bus!

#### Did you know ...?

-PSE is a part of the Providence Transportation Zone. They are in charge of assigning sub buses/drivers when needed. Any concerns about transportation times and late buses can be addressed at the Zone office. Their number is: 980-343-5715.

-Bus stops/routes are created by CMS Transportation. Any stop changes/requests must go through this department. They may be reached through the CMS homepage:

-The Providence Zone is still short approximately 20+ bus drivers. This means any illness, personal days, etc. may result in substitute drivers.

As we receive updates from CMS Transportation, we will send them out on the app. Please note, we do not always receive bus changes until after the fact, but strive to get notification to you as quickly as we can. Joining the Remind group is easy. Just follow these instructions:

## Attendance Policy

Important Information regarding ATTENDANCE.....



Please report all absences to pseabsent@cms.k12.nc.us

Unexcused absences or unexcused tardies:

If your student is marked with an **unexcused** absence or tardy, you <u>will</u> receive either a phone call and/or email from CMS asking you to inform the school of the reason your student is absent or late. If you have already let us know why your child is not in attendance, <u>you do not have to call the</u> <u>school</u>. The phone calls and/or emails are generated by CMS each and every day of the absence. We cannot stop them from happening.

Your student must be in attendance for 210 minutes for the school day to count. If your child is in school at 8:00 am, the earliest she/he can be picked up for early dismissal so as not to be marked absent, is **11:30 am**.

If you need to make a same day change in the way your child is going home, you must call the office by 2:15 pm if you did not send a note to the classroom teacher. School policy does not allow teachers to accept same day transportation changes via email.

At the end of our school day, the latest that your child can be picked up for early dismissal is 2:30 pm.


